MESSAGE FROM

FIRE CHIEF **Scott W. Walker**

I would like to begin by thanking all of the men and women of the Addison Fire Protection District (AFPD) for all they do. They truly are the ones who make AFPD the exceptional fire district that it is and I could not be prouder to serve as their fire chief.

This past year saw a changing of the administration of the fire district when Fire Chief Joe Leone retired after 28 years of service with AFPD. With his retirement, I was appointed by the Board of Trustees to serve as the 15th fire chief of the fire district since its creation in 1926. Due to the close working relationship of all of the chiefs within the fire district and robust succession planning, this changing of administrations was seamless and instant and will serve as a blueprint to future administrations as changes occur in the future. Chief Leone was not the only retirement in 2019. Six additional members bid AFPD farewell after long successful careers. Included in these six was the long time administrative assistant of the fire district, Jean Gugliuzza. Her retirement presented an opportunity to reorganize administrative staff functions to provide more efficiency and better succession planning in the future.

The fire district was proud to be recognized by several outside agencies over 2019. The fire district's commitment to safety was on display with the 2019 with the receipt of Illinois Public Risk Fund's (IPRF) Member of the Year Award and the Safety and Health Achievement Recognition

Program (SHARP) award from the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA). IPRF, an intergovernmental joint insurance pool, awards their Member of the Year award to one of their over 500 public entities who display a strong commitment to safety. OSHA awards its SHARP award to employers who operate exemplary safety and health management systems.

On the non-safety front in 2019, AFPD was recognized by the Government Finance Officers Association in two areas. Our annual financial reporting achieved a fifth consecutive Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting. In the area of budgeting, we are pleased to report we achieved our first Distinguished Budget Presentation award. Both of these awards show the commitment of AFPD to follow best practices in the area of finance and transparency.

As we look ahead to 2020, we are excited to see what the New Year will bring. We anticipate being able to achieve two large goals in the coming year with the first being addressing the unfunded liabilities of the firefighters' pension fund. Current and anticipated band market conditions in the coming year will likely present an opportunity to fully fund our firefighters' pension fund with the issuance of pension obligation bonds. These bonds, if issued, would bring our firefighters' pension fund to 100% funding without increasing the taxes paid to the fire district by property owners. The second long standing goal we hope to accomplish in 2020 is the completion of the accreditation process through the Commission of Fire Accreditation International.

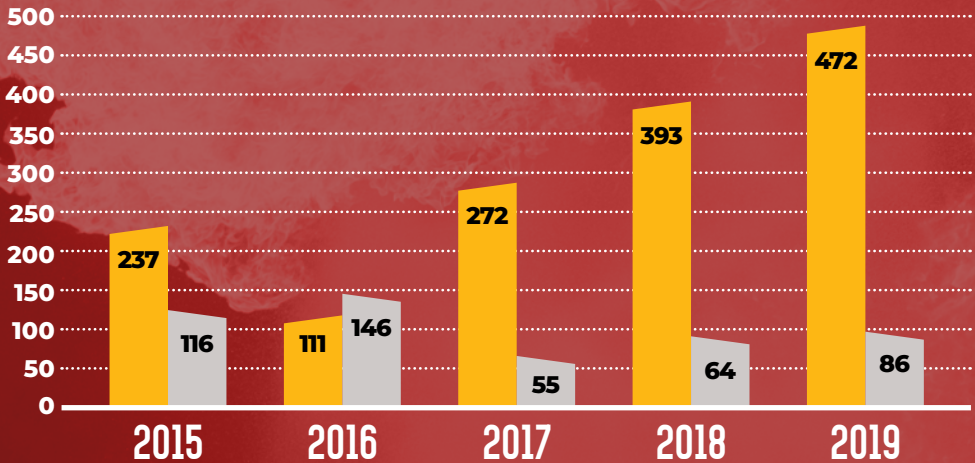

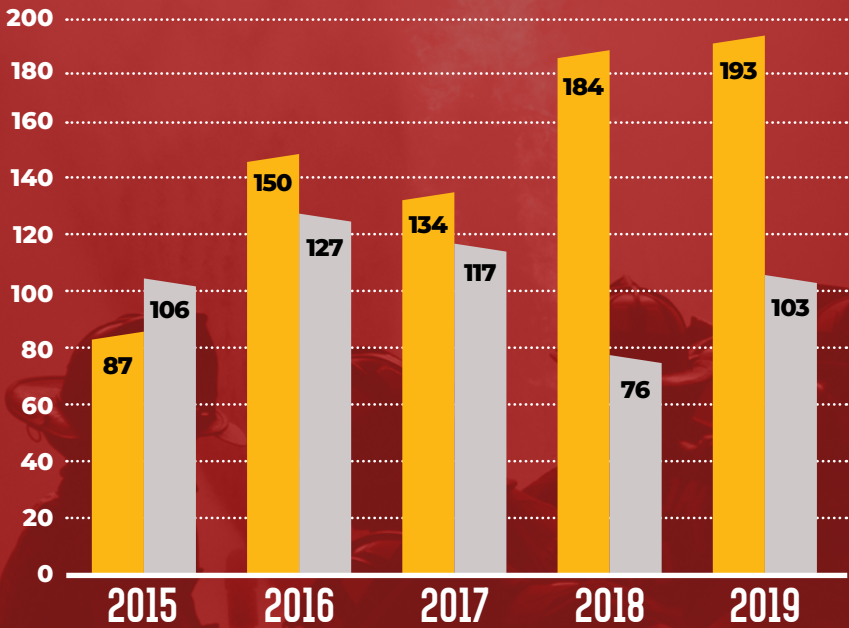

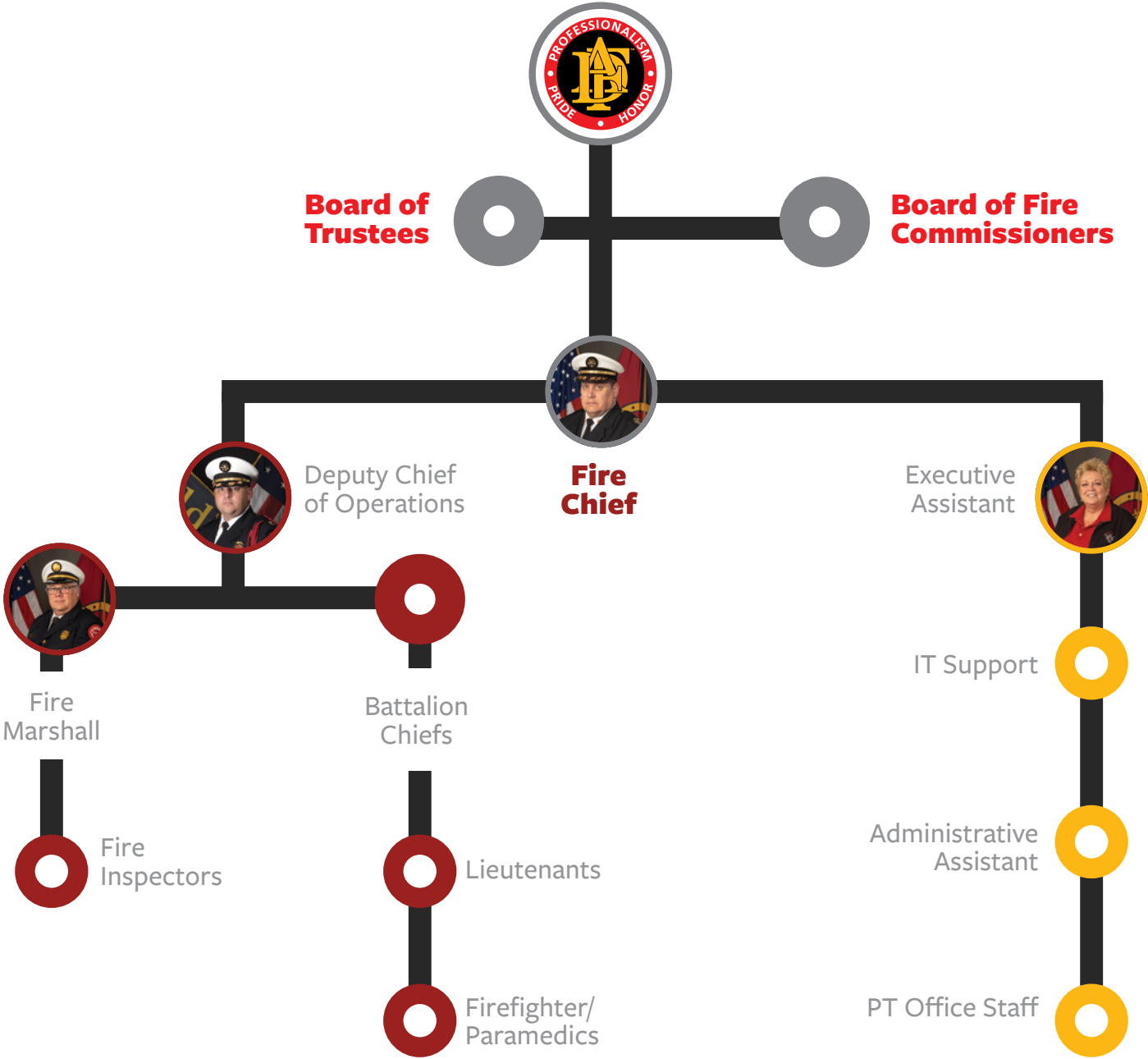

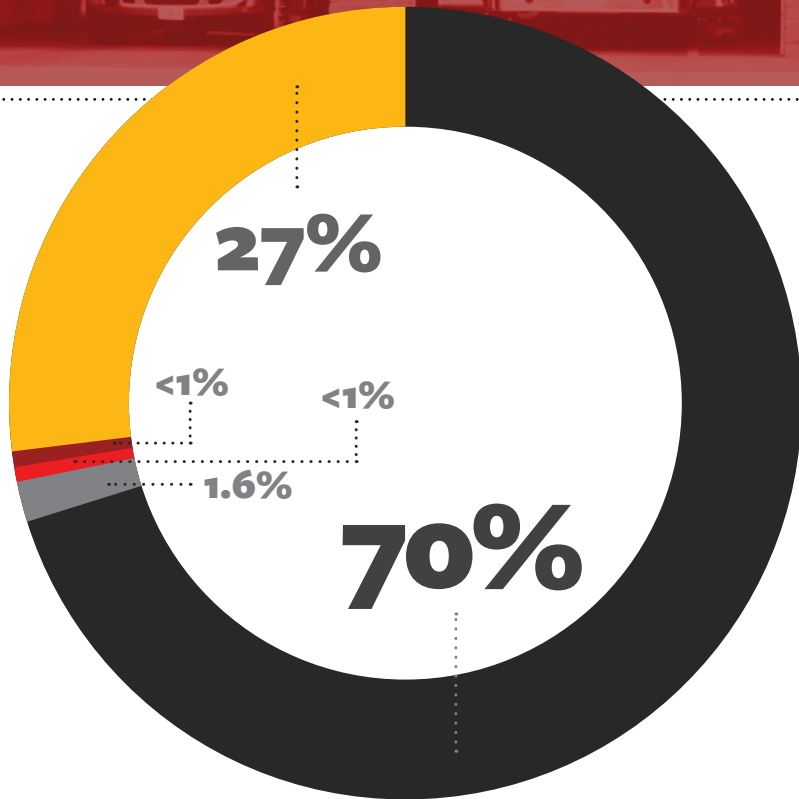
ORGANIZATIONAL CHART

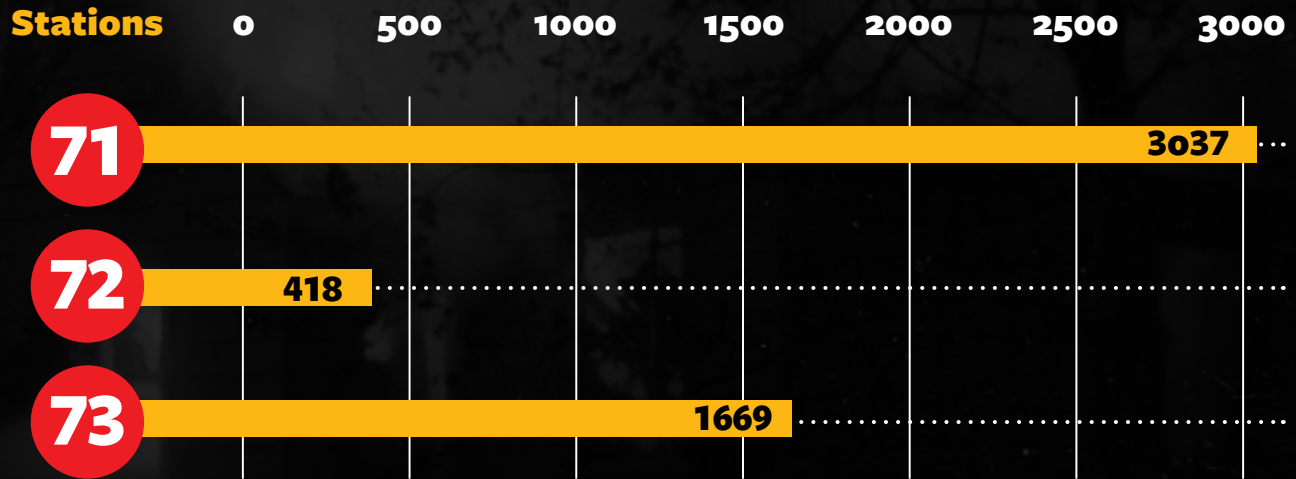

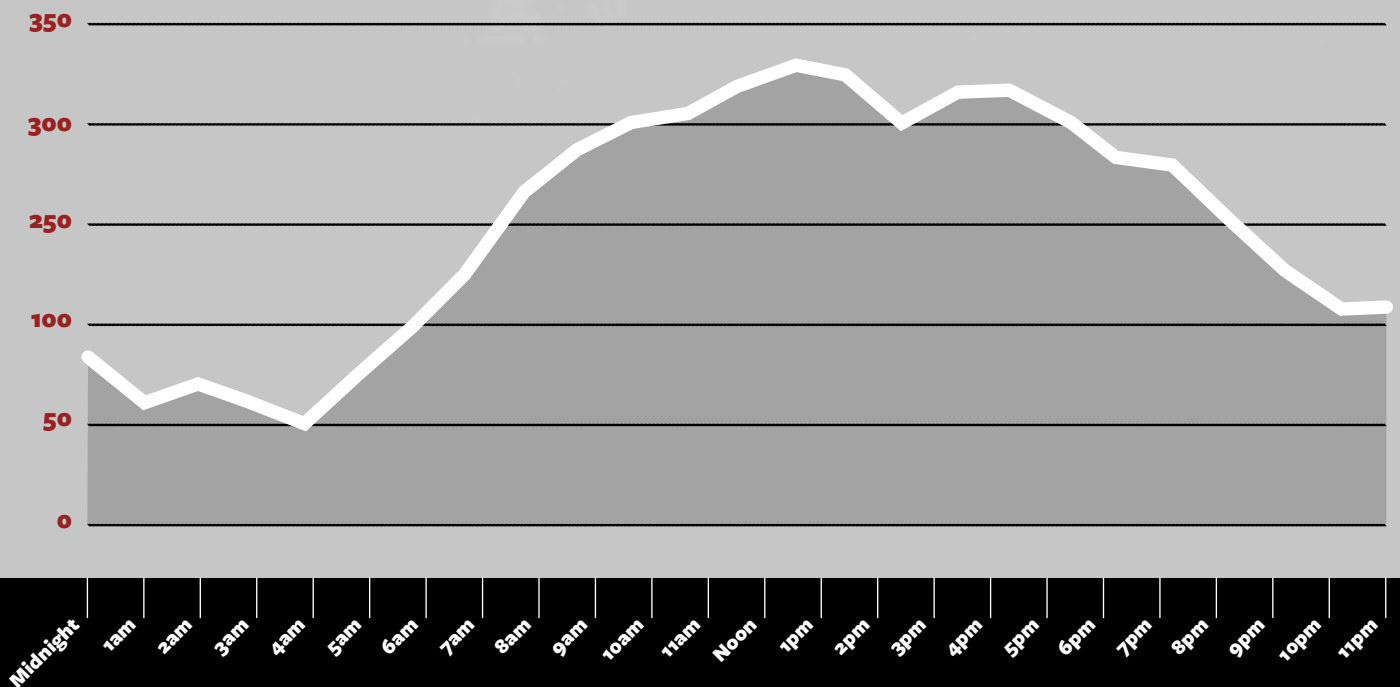

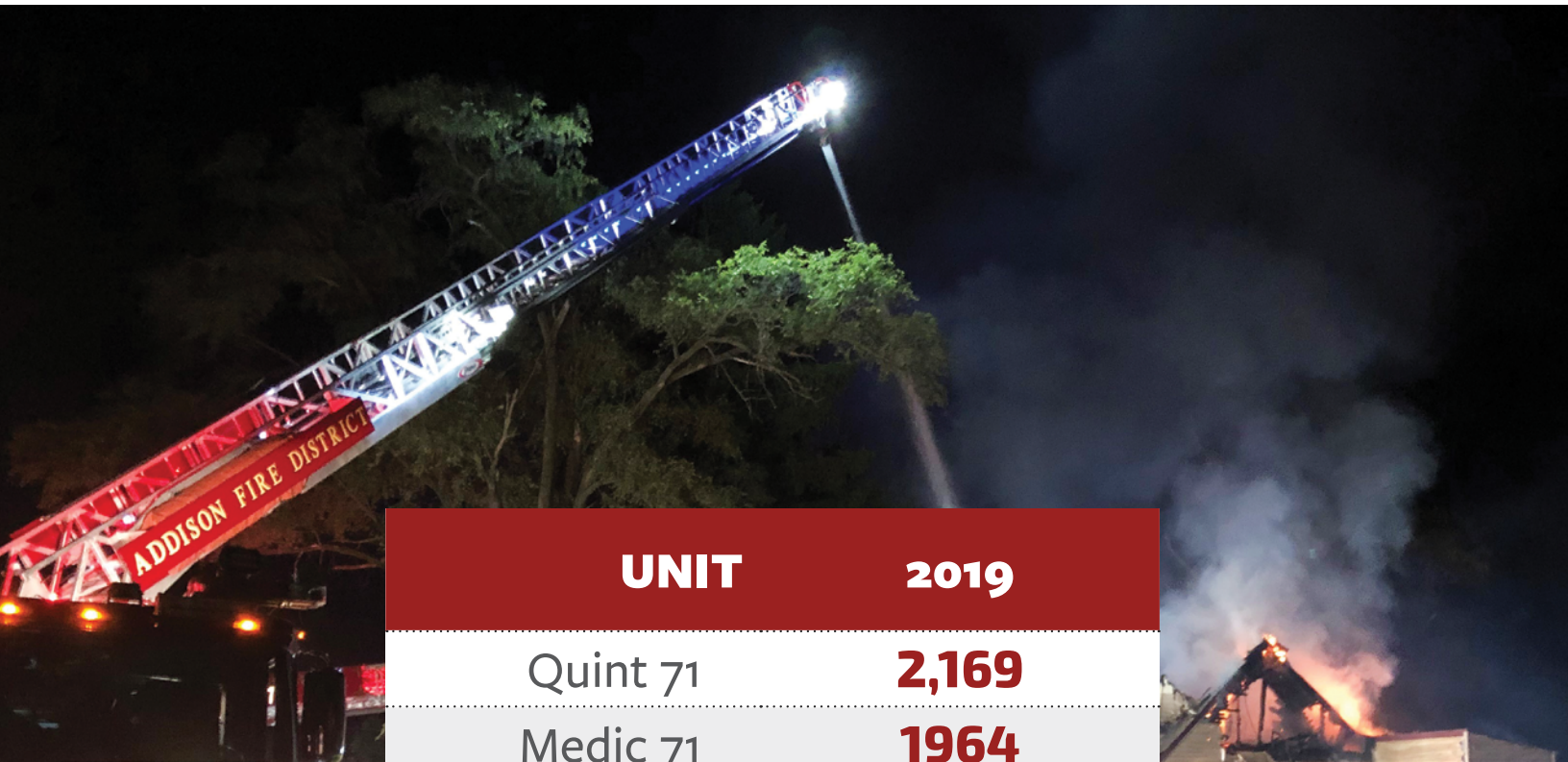

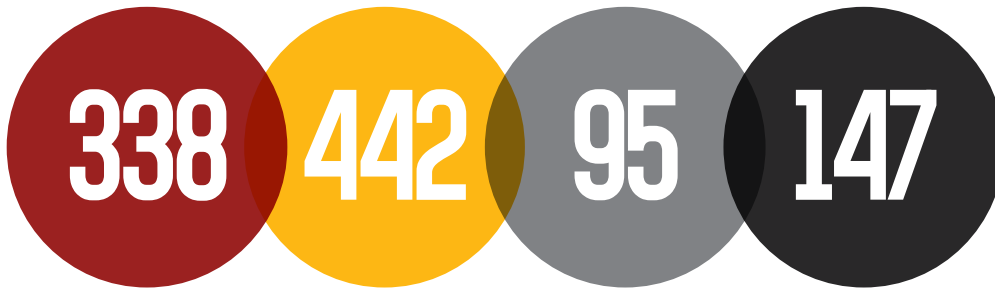

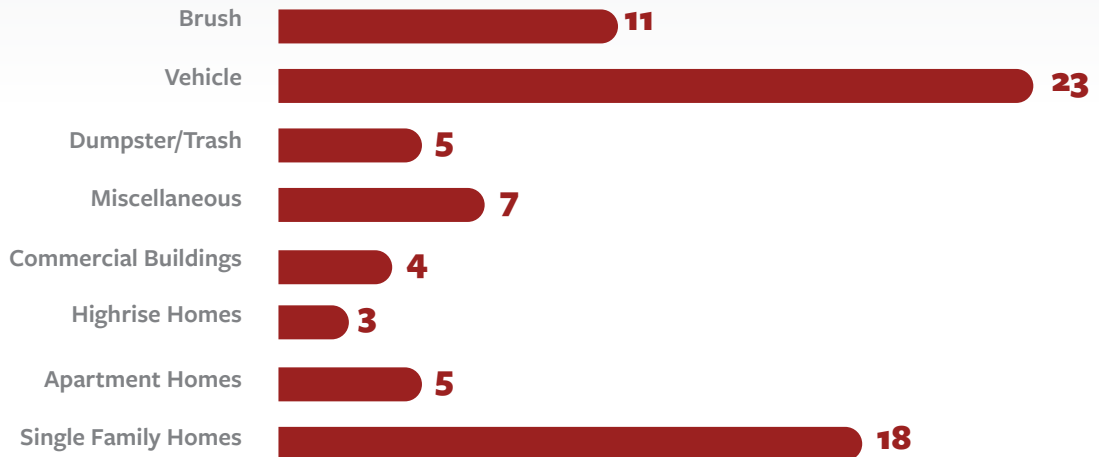
*Potential Dollar Loss

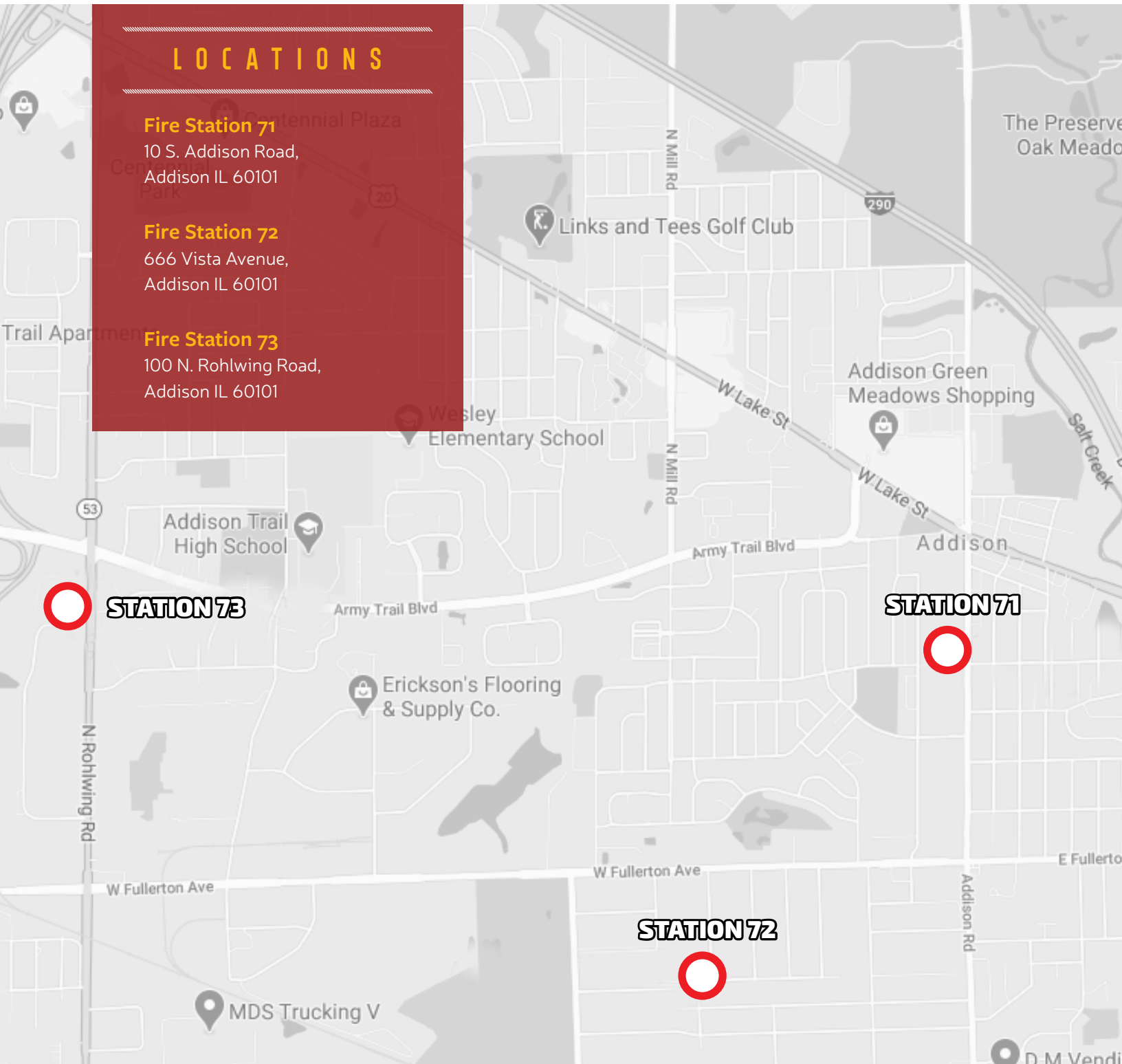
