



MESSAGE FROM FIRE CHIEF Scott W. Walker

As we close the book on 2022, we have an opportunity to reflect on what made the year a successful one for the Addison Fire Protection District (AFPD). Faced with a COVID-19 pandemic persisting, other illness that were more pronounced as we emerged from lockdowns, personnel shortages, and a record number of calls for service, AFPD never missed a beat in providing professional high-quality service to our community. This was only made possible by the dedicated, hardworking, and professional members who make up the ranks of AFPD. I could not be prouder to have served with these members for a third year as fire chief.

I was pleased to report last year we achieved accreditation through the Commission on Fire Accreditation International (CFAI). This process is by no means a "one and done" project or goal. To maintain our accredited status, we are required to annually submit an annual compliance report (ACR) which records our commitment to the quality improvement process and to report our status as it relates to progress made toward addressing strategic and specific recommendations. We successfully completed our first ACR in 2022.

It is important to be transparent in everything we do, especially when our operations are primarily funded by the

taxpayers. To this end, AFPD submits both our annual audit and budget to the Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) for review and recommendations. In 2022, AFPD once again received the Achievement in Excellence for Financial Reporting and the Distinguished Budget Presentation Award from the GFOA.

This past year we were again awarded the Safety and Health Achievement Recognition Program (SHARP) award from the United States Department of Labor Occupational Safety and Health Administration. The recognition is important to us because it shows our commitment to keep our most important asset, our employees, safe and healthy while they perform the hazardous duties they face daily.

It is not only important to care for and about our employees, but also to make sure they have the best equipment to work with and the best fire stations to work from 24 hours a day. We are constantly assessing our equipment and fire stations to ensure we are meeting the expectations of our employees and the community we serve. This past year we updated our extrication equipment, replaced our ambulance stretchers, updated our cardiac monitors, replaced the hand tools both on our apparatus and within of fire stations. Additionally, we replaced the windows at two fire stations, replaced and updated multiple garage door operating systems, repairs and sealed all our parking lots and put new ambulance in service. The process of keeping of fleet up to date is never ending. In 2022 we started the process of replacing our oldest fire engine with the hope of getting an order in sometime in mid-2023.

We are looking forward to 2023 and are excited to see what a new year will bring. 
VISION






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These call volumes include responses to surrounding communities based on automatic aid agreements with other departments.


RESPONSES BY HOUR OF THE DAY




Classes range from citizen Heartsaver to medical professional ACLS/PALS classes
